Charles Peterson's Nirvana Showcases Dynamic Photography at Tacoma Art Museum in October

TACOMA, WA (February 15, 2024) – Tacoma Art Museum, in collaboration with Minor Matters, will open an exhibition of the work of Northwest photographer Charles Peterson on October 5, 2024. *Charles Peterson's Nirvana* highlights the dynamic energy of Peterson's black-and-white photographs, which have become synonymous with the sounds, styles, movement, and attitude known as grunge.

"Photography is still underrepresented in many contemporary art spheres. Music photography in particular is often dismissed as being more about its subjects than the unique specificities and artistry of how they are seen by a particular practitioner. The approach to Charles Peterson's most recent publication, and now this exciting exhibition opening at Tacoma Art Museum with the goal of traveling thereafter, centers the relationship between his photography, and the music of Nirvana, a short-lived yet iconic contributor to the culture of the late 20th century.

"The exhibition also places Peterson's photographs — some of which have never before been printed — in dialogue with select works by other resonant artists to draw out specific qualities in his work."

Charles Peterson (b.1964, Longview, Washington) is internationally known for his photographs of the Seattle music scene of the late '80s and '90s. He began making photographs while a student at Bothell High School, and then went on to study photography at the University Washington, where he first met as friends many of his future subjects. Peterson's distinct visual style and early work for Sub Pop Records became an important signifier of the phenomenon known as grunge. His photographs have been featured in numerous publications, as well as exhibited in group and solo exhibitions around the world. They are included in many private collections and the permanent collections of the Seattle Art Museum and MoPOP. Previous books include *Screaming Life* (Harper Collins, 1996) *Pearl Jam: Place Date* (Rizzoli/Ten, 1998), *Touch Me I'm Sick, Cypher* (powerhouse, 2003, 2008), and *Genius* (Frye Art Museum, 2015). About Minor Matters: Founded in 2013, Minor Matters is a collaborative publishing platform producing exquisite art books often by underrepresented voices through its collaborative publishing model, preselling books to the general public and naming those purchasers within the books they facilitate. Their model has resulted in "first books" for over 10 authors, with half of their monographs featuring practitioners from the west coast of the United States.
